**Was the Passover
festival just Old
Testament history,
or was it pointing to
the life of Christ...**

Exodus 12:1-3 (ESV) ¹ The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, ² "This month shall be for you the beginning of months.

It shall be the first month of the year for you. ³ Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month every man shall take a

lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household.

Moses and Aaron were shadows of what Jesus would fulfill (Moses as a great prophet, and Aaron as the first high priest of Israel).

Jesus' sacrifice is for every household that believes, repents, and obeys. The father of each household is called to lead their families in the faith. The Lamb of God provides an exodus from sin.

The tenth day of Abib was the same day Jesus rode into Jerusalem and was identified as the Lamb of God who would bring salvation (Hosanna!).

John 1:29 (LSB) On the next day, he saw Jesus coming to him and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!"

Exodus 12:4-5 (NIV) ⁴ If any household is too small for a whole lamb, they must share one with their nearest neighbor, having taken into account the number of people there are. You are to determine the amount of lamb needed in accordance with what each person will eat.

⁵ The animals you choose must be year-old males without defect, and you may take them from the sheep or the goats.

Jesus provides the means for our spiritual nourishment, and His sacrifice cleanses the smallest and largest sins. In the New Covenant, we are called to continually feed on/ abide in Jesus through God's word, prayer, and fellowship with the body of Christ

Jesus' sacrifice was only successful because He was without sin. We don't have the means to redeem our souls, our lives. Only the power of the cross of Christ can produce salvation. The lamb of God alone takes away the sin of the world

Do you know that the covering of Jesus' blood, alone, brings justification?

Exodus 12:6-8 (NKJV) ⁶ Now you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of the same month. Then the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill it at twilight. ⁷ And they shall take *some* of the blood and put *it* on the two doorposts and on the lintel of the houses where they eat it. ⁸ Then they shall eat the flesh on that night; roasted in fire, with unleavened bread *and* with bitter *herbs* they shall eat it.

Jesus gave up His life on the 14th of Abib at approximately twilight. His sacrifice is for all who believe and follow Him.

Salvation doesn't come by osmosis. You must choose to feed on the Bread of Life through belief, repentance, and obedience. Faith without action is dead.

Jesus' blood poured out on the horizontal and vertical wooden beams so that our sins could be passed over.

As each day passes, are you feeding on the Bread of Life to look more and more like Jesus?

Exodus 12:9-11 (HCSB) ⁹ Do not eat any of it raw or cooked in boiling water, but only roasted over fire—its head as well as its legs and inner organs. ¹⁰ Do not let any of it remain until morning; you must burn up any part of it that does remain before morning. ¹¹ Here is how

you must eat it: you must be dressed for travel, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. You are to eat it in a hurry; it is the LORD's Passover.

God's word tells us how to love and follow Jesus. We don't get to choose how to worship or how to abide in Jesus apart from the direction of His word. His sacrifice is sacred and holy, and our obedience honors Him

With Jesus fulfilling the Passover, conquering sin and death, we are called leave our old lives behind for the sake of Christ and the Promised Land of the Kingdom of God. This kingdom has already arrived and lasts forever with God's family

Has your old life been left behind for the pursuit of God's Kingdom and for the love of Christ?
